"As the deer panteth for the water, so my soul longeth after Thee. You alone are my heart's desire, and I long to worship Thee."

These words begin one of my favorite songs that we sing at camp. It has a beautiful, meditative flow, and when a group is singing it together, it feels transcendent.

But more than that, I appreciate the message in the lyrics. They're inspired by Psalm 42, which begins, "As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God" (NRSV).

That verb, "longs," expresses a deep, almost desperate, pull toward something that fulfills a great need. A dictionary definition of "longing" calls it "prolonged, unceasing, or earnest desire."

Author Melissa Bane Sevier, reflecting on Psalm 42, says it is "A sense that something is missing. Or that something has been lost and you don't remember where you put it or what happened to it. Maybe it just drifted away from you on a raft, on that sea of everything. It's a common human experience. Who doesn't yearn for something more?"

Over the past month-plus, as the COVID-19 shutdown has kept us almost completely confined to our homes, I've intensely noticed some things for which I long: visits with friends and family, eating a good home-cooked or professionally cooked meal, being able to travel, watching baseball and other sports, and, of course, being gathered with you all for worship.

We know that the church is much more than a building. As Audrey Zunkel-deCoursey writes in *Messenger*, "This strange moment is teaching us some lessons about what being church is all about." But I do miss being together. It's not the defining element of faith, but it's an important piece—perhaps more so for a tradition like the Brethren that has always lifted up the essential nature of community in being followers of Christ.

So I long for the Sunday when we are all worshiping in our sanctuary again. But in the meantime, I invite you to think about the things for which you yearn—even as we continue to be the church in our scattered places. Those tugs and pulls of longing show us what is close to our hearts, and what it is we really miss.

Going back to Sevier, she says: "Beauty and peace, love and happiness, joy and hope. It's the *noticing*, the paying attention to all the life-affirming moments that increase our humanity and the humanity of those around us. Longing with a thirsty soul means, in part, that we allow the soul to focus on the good things."

Look for the good in these weeks ahead, and may the love of God flow into all the thirstiest parts of your souls.

RESOURCES DURING THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

While we normally urge you to reach out to each other and the community, we encourage you to do that at a safe distance for the coming weeks! Until guidelines change, please stay home as much as possible, go out only for important needs or appointments that can't be missed, and take care of yourself physically and mentally. If you have a need that you can't meet yourself, please let your deacons or Pastor Walt know.

The director of the World Health Organization offered this advice recently on CNN: "If your local or national guidelines allow it, go outside for a walk, a run, or a ride and keep a safe distance from others. If you can't leave the house, find an exercise video online, do some yoga, or walk up and down the stairs. Get your information from reliable sources once or twice a day."

We have asked deacons to be in touch periodically with those in their care groups, and you are all urged to call, text, email, write, or otherwise connect from a distance with your friends from church and elsewhere. Be especially attentive to those who live alone and/or are homebound.

At this time, all worship services and activities at the church are cancelled until state and district guidance permits us to resume. We will update you on dates as more information becomes available.

INFORMATION FROM CAMP MARDELA REGARDING COVID-19

Despite the uncertainties surrounding COVID-19, we want our camp families (and new families!) to be able to register for summer camp with confidence. Here's what we're doing to help that to happen:

- 1. We are closely monitoring public and verifiable information about the current health crisis and what that might mean for our summer camp season. The recent "stay at home" orders issued by the governor of Maryland currently extends to the end of April. Depending on what happens following this, it could impact our first few summer camp weeks. Of course, any future order could be revoked, reduced, or extended at any time as our leaders navigate this public health crisis.
- 2. We are exploring and creating various modifications to our staff training and summer camp schedules to allow for a later start date, if needed, and expanded program options in July to accommodate all interested campers. We are also looking at ways that we can structure our program (smaller area family groups, for example) in order to keep campers and staff safe and comply with all health and legal regulations. We are also reviewing our initial health screening procedures for campers and staff, as well as our cleaning/disinfecting procedures. For now, as we continue to plan and prepare, we just need to wait and see how things progress on the local, state, and federal levels, and then be ready to put whatever is needed into place for the summer.

3. We are modifying our deposit and registration payment policies for 2020 in the following ways:

If a child's summer camp program needs to be canceled because of the COVID-19 virus based on Department of Health recommendations; by local, state, or federal government regulations; and/or by the decision of camp leadership (including the Director and Camp Doctor), any registration payments, including the full non-refundable/non-transferable deposit, will be refunded to the camper family or credited toward a future camp program, based on the preference of the family/church.

If a child is unable to attend summer camp because of the COVID-19 virus based on a written physician's note, Department of Health recommendations, and/or local, state, or federal regulations, any registration payments, including the full non-refundable/non-transferable deposit, will be credited toward a future camp program OR the registration payments minus the non-refundable/non-transferable deposit will be refunded to the family and the non-refundable/non-transferable deposit will be credited toward a future camp program, based on the preference of the family/church.

- 4. We are recommending that families register their campers for the camp programs you would prefer so that we have accurate information related to camper/program interests in order to make adjustments to the schedule as needed. Registration trends will indicate which programs are drawing camper interest. Later weeks of the summer, particularly in July, are more likely to still be held as planned but nothing has been cancelled yet. Should camp programs need to be cancelled due to COVID-19, camp staff will contact affected campers to reschedule for later in the summer or issue a refund or credit based on the family/church preference.
- 5. Registration is available online or via snail mail. If you are in need of registration materials for snail mail registration, please contact the camp at campmardela@gmail.com. In order to register you will need to pay the \$55 registration fee. Once again, if your program is canceled due to COVID-19 or if you camper acquires COVID-19 your registration fee will be refunded. If you would like to register, but are currently unable to afford the registration fee, please, contact the camp at campmardela@gmail.com to make arrangements to hold your spot.



Due to the ongoing uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 outbreak, the Camp Mardela board at its
