A song from the musical "South Pacific" says, "You have to be taught to hate and fear. You've got to be taught from year to year." A part of me has been wondering lately if that is true. Certainly, leaders and teachers of various sorts can stoke the flames of hatred and bias within us, but there seems to be a piece inside humanity that naturally wants to set us above the "other"—those who are different in some way. How and why that happens, I don't know.

From the earliest pages of scripture, we see Cain carrying out violence on his brother Abel, Joseph's brothers selling him into slavery, Jacob cheating his brother Esau, warmongering generals, deceitful kings, all manner of war between rival nations, and on and on. The Old Testament, in particular, reads like an R-rated soap opera. God keeps calling the people back, but they keep going astray. It's no wonder that Jesus spent so much time extolling love and compassion and real justice.

I recently watched two episodes of the Steven Spielberg documentary "Why We Hate," a six-part series first introduced last fall. Tracking hate and its effects through history, it asks again and again that basic question: "Why?" It notes how easy it is to create an "us against them" mentality in which we gradually dehumanize "them" into something less than us. But by dehumanizing others, Spielberg argues, we end up destroying our own humanity in the process. "We all have elements of hatred in us," he says.

The worst flare-ups of such hate generally occur, he says, when charismatic leaders rise up with "my way or the highway" messages that seek to polarize and to exploit people's fear—especially the fear of change. Nazi Germany is the classic example of this, but Spielberg also notes other such populist movements: The Rwanda genocide, Pol Pot in Cambodia, and others. Others begin to follow along, and soon whole populations are caught up in evil agendas as they become "blinded by an idea."

One international criminal lawyer from Philadelphia observed that it's not a sudden move to hating one's neighbor enough to kill them. Instead, "We get there step by step," she said. We're gradually convinced that an "enemy out there" needs to be dealt with, forcefully. Social media has made those messages of hate and division spread more quickly and more easily, whether the target is immigrants, various ethnic populations, Jews, Muslims, or others.

We're seeing echoes of this narrative play out in the headlines of recent weeks, as America confronts its own legacy of hatred and "other-ing" related to black Americans and the legacy of slavery. While official slavery might have been eliminated here more than 150 years ago, parts of the unjust framework and attitudes that set up one group over another have continued to have repercussions in our society. And we still have leaders at various levels eager to stoke those divides.

Lest this all seem hopeless, the documentary observes that in each of history's worst chapters of hate, there have been people who "resist evil" and "push back against the darkness." So while there might be seeds of hatred in us, there are seeds of goodness, too. We must be conscious which of those possibilities we nurture and draw upon, examining ourselves regularly. Confronting hatred with acts of love, courage, and open conversation can sometimes have surprising results for change, cascading into society-wide responses. Perhaps goodness, too, must be carefully taught and encouraged.

"We're at a pivotal moment," an introduction to Spielberg's work said. "Hate, anger, and violence are tearing us apart." How will we be part of recognizing the humanity of all God's children?

### Members and friends of Easton Church of the Brethren:

Greetings! We've continued to monitor the health situation in our area, and after recent conversations with the Leadership Team, we've decided it's time to take the next step of re-opening: Starting this coming Sunday, July 5, we will return to having worship in the sanctuary. The worship time, for now, will remain at **10 a.m.** Christian education classes will not be meeting over the summer.

While it's been fun to meet on the lawn and see our neighborhood up close, we know many of you will be glad to be in more familiar surroundings. Please note, though, that it won't be quite "normal" yet, as we'll be taking a number of precautions to meet current guidelines and protocols, including the following:

- --The state is currently allowing indoor worship at up to 50 percent capacity, which we should have no trouble observing. But we will be blocking off some pews to encourage distancing, and the balcony will be an option for those who want some more space. We'll also do our best to maintain good ventilation in the building.
- --Please wear a mask and allow at least six feet between you and anyone who's not a member of your household.
- --Please do not congregate in the narthex or the aisles before or after the service. Come in, find your seats, and get settled. If you want to visit with others, please do it outside. Inside and outside doors will be propped open, and hand sanitizer will be available.
- --Offering plates will not be passed through the congregation; they will be in the narthex to receive any offerings you want to give. We will also be removing unnecessary materials from the pews.
- --We won't have greeters. Bulletins will be available in a rack in the narthex for pick-up.
- --We'll still refrain from congregational singing for some time, and the choir will not be meeting for the foreseeable future.
- --Please limit restroom use to one person at a time.

If you have questions, please let us know. Thanks for your patience and understanding during this challenging season!



# **Camp Mardela News**

Camp Mardela update: Following a recommendation from camp administrator Gieta Gresh, who has been keeping track of all the government and camp guidance related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Camp Mardela board voted in late May to cancel all summer programs at the camp. The decision was made out of concerns for health and safety, as well as limitations that would have made it difficult to achieve the type of community and involvement that we envision for our campers. Events in August and later remain on at this point, but that is subject to change. The Camp Supper is currently planned for Sept. 19 and the auction for Oct. 3. Please watch the camp website and other communications for updates as they become available. And please continue to be in prayer for the camp and its staff and for our larger community in this time.

Camp Mardela is seeking a camp administrator. Camp Mardela is a Church of the Brethren-affiliated 125-acre retreat and summer camp facility bordering Martinak State Park on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. The camp seeks a gifted and visionary individual with a passion for outdoor ministry to serve as the next camp administrator. This full-time position is open as of Jan. 1, 2021. A full position description is available upon request. Qualifications for this position include strong skills in administration, organization, communication, marketing, program development, hospitality, and leadership, along with basic computer and finance skills. A bachelor's degree and/or appropriate certification is required, along with at least two seasons of camp supervisory experience and knowledge and an understanding of ACA core competencies. Candidates must be at least 25 years of age. The administrator should be a Christian and a member of the Church of the Brethren or have an appreciation and understanding of Brethren beliefs and values. Health benefits and on-site housing and utilities (in a separate home near the camp office) are included, along with annual funds for professional growth. The volunteer opportunities listed below are currently closed due to COVID-19. Please keep these opportunities in mind when things re-open.


### Neighborhood Service Center
