For all the beauty and heart-warming images of the "traditional" Christmas story told in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke—the stable, the manger, the angels, the wise men—there's something about the poetic and mysterious language in the opening chapter of the Gospel of John that speaks to this season in a way that nothing else can.

Pastor can.
"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. . . . In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. . . . The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world" (John 1:1, 4-5, 9, NIV).

First-century Palestine was a rather bleak place in many ways. The land was occupied by the Roman army, with strict rules, heavy taxation, and other limits on daily life. It was a stratified society of have's and have-not's, one in which large swaths of people had few if any rights, one where lepers were ostracized and those with disabilities had to beg near the temple.

For many people, it was a rather hopeless time. And it was into that world that the light burst in: an announcement by John the Baptist, a vision to Mary and Joseph, a blaze of glory to shepherds in a field, and eventually a new dawn for an entire world. The heavy challenges of the time did not instantly disappear, but things certainly looked different for those who saw.

We hear the passionate words of the elderly saint at the temple, Simeon, as he finally laid eyes on the baby Jesus—this child for whom he had waited so long: "For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel" (Luke 2:30-32, NIV).

Two millennia later, as this rather bleak year of 2020 with its own long litany of difficult events comes to a close, what do we see?

Some of you may have found my Facebook post a few weeks back, describing a night when I ventured out into the yard to scan the night sky for the Leonid meteor shower, which had promised a good show. After 15 or 20 chilly minutes of fruitless searching I had decided to go back inside. And then, just as I scanned the eastern sky for one more look, a brilliant "shooting star" curved its way across my field of vision, leaving me with a "Wow" on my lips. I said that it was a reminder for me that hope often appears just when we're ready to turn away.

How will the light burst into our midst this Advent and Christmas season? Perhaps this year we will more fully appreciate what it means to encounter Christmas as they did in that little town of Bethlehem so many years ago:

"Yet in thy dark streets shineth, the everlasting Light.

The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight."

THE CAMP MARDELA SILENT AUCTION

It's almost time for Camp Mardela's silent auction! The auction will officially "go live" Monday morning (Nov. 30) at 8 a.m., and bidding will close at 6 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 6. You can find the auction at 32auctions.com/ CampMardela2020.

Anyone can browse, but to bid you will need to create an account (similar to eBay and other online purchasing sites). You can find that link at the top right of the site. If you win any items, you'll be able to make payment by credit card online or by sending check or cash to Camp Mardela within a week of the auction's conclusion. Free delivery will be available within 20 miles of camp or to any Eastern Shore Church of the Brethren congregation. Otherwise, winning bidders can arrange for shipping at additional cost or pick up their item(s) at the camp.

We expect about three dozen items to be up for bid, including an Ocean City condo stay, firewood, handmade crafts, theme baskets, collectible coins, special camp items, and much more. You might find the perfect Christmas gift! (Note: Many items will have minimum bids; if those minimums aren't met, then the items will be held for the 2021 auction, which hopefully will be held in person.) We encourage congregations to do a "preview" of the auction this Sunday by displaying the auction site in your online worship or on a screen if you are meeting in person.

Camp Mardela Announces a new Camp Administrator

The Camp Mardela board of directors is pleased to announced Jennifer Lynn Summy as the next administrator of Camp Mardela, located on 125 acres adjacent to Martinak State Park in Denton, Md. Summy will begin the position on Jan. 4, 2021.

A graduate of Lebanon Valley College (Annville, Pa.) with a B.A. in Music Business, Summy is currently working on completing a master's degree in Business Administration and Ministry from Mount Vernon (Ohio) Nazarene University. She has previously worked as a bank teller near her home in Duncannon, Pa., and as a counselor at Camp Swatara (Bethel, Pa.).

In addition to her business and camping background, she brings to the position extensive experience in music and theater, as well as advanced Spanish-speaking abilities and a deep faith life. She recently spent a year as a worship coordinator for The World Race, with time in a variety of contexts on four continents.

"A week at camp is a powerful catalyst in the faith of children and youth, and I am passionate about making the most of that experience for all parties involved," Summy said. "Every step of my spiritual journey has come from the growth and relationships at camp, and I believe that God works in mighty ways when we meet Him in the heart of His creation."

Summy's call to the position comes after a wide-ranging, months-long search process. She succeeds Gieta Gresh, who has served the camp as administrator since spring 2005.

Affiliated with the Mid-Atlantic District of the Church of the Brethren, Camp Mardela was established in 1948 and has been serving children and youth summer campers and year-round rental groups ever since. Summy's work will include leading the camp through its strategic plan centered around its 75th anniversary: "Celebrating 75 Years, Serving the Future." Major annual events include the camp auction each spring and a camp supper in the fall.
