PASTOR'S PAGE JANUARY 2021

It says it right up top. 2021. Yes, 2020 is now behind us. Some of its legacy will be with us for a while yet, until the pandemic is controlled and some sense of normalcy returns, but it still feels good to flip that calendar page from an intensely difficult year. It is, to use a Latin phrase, a "tabula rasa"—a clean slate.

While it's easy to dwell on all the things we've lost during the past year and all the things we missed, it's important that we also focus on the good things in our midst, and where God's Spirit is stirring. As it says in Psalm 33:5, "The earth is full of the steadfast love of the Lord."

Where do we see that among us? Consider the following:

- In a year when many congregations were stretched to survive, we continue to have a thriving group that enjoys each other's fellowship and praising God together. We have found ways to connect and worship together safely, at least in a limited fashion, with smiles, prayers, and beautiful, creative music. It looks like we'll finish 2020 with income over expense, even with several months of an unoccupied rental house and significant renovations to that property.
- While the pandemic numbers everywhere are problematic, Maryland has been one of the better states in the country in regards of the incidence of COVID-19, and our country has been fortunate to be one of the best in the state, with the fewest COVID deaths recorded in all of Maryland. Our congregation has been able to stay safe and well.
- We have lost a few local businesses, but many have weathered the storm thus far, and Easton has a vibrant and beautiful downtown and other neighborhoods. Be sure to thank the local business owners and patronize them when you can. And thank our health care workers and teachers, too. They've really been stepping up in a time of need, including some right here in our church.
- In just the past few months, our congregation has been able to deliver donations to the Neighborhood Service Center, almost two dozen boxes of food for local seniors in need, Christmas care packages to the residents of Dixon House, contributions for Camp Mardela, meals for the Talbot Interfaith Shelter and support for their expansion efforts, lunches for the Ridgeway shelter, and more. It's good to see us doing significant outreach, especially in a time of heightened need.
- Speaking of Camp Mardela, we had to say farewell to long-time administrator Gieta Gresh as she moves to Pennsylvania, but the camp has called a new administrator, Jennifer Summy, who is bringing fresh vision and energy of her own to lead our camp forward. Like our church, it appears the camp was able to end the year on solid financial footing, while grants and special donations allowed a new roof to go on the King Retreat Center and craft house, new playground equipment to be installed, and more.

I suspect many other things could be added to that list. As many writers have observed, much depends on our perspective: Do we look at places of abundance, or places where things are lacking? Whatever difficulties you have endured this past year, I hope you continue to see those places of abundance and hope.

We have no guarantees of what this new year will hold, of course. But we know that God continues the journey with us. And wherever God is, goodness is present. Happy new year.

43rd Annual Meat Canning Project

The annual meat canning is a joint effort of the Mid-Atlantic and Southern Pennsylvania Districts. The goal of the canning project is to help feed people experiencing food insecurity, both locally and overseas.

Due to the uncertainties surrounding Covid-19, the Meat Canning Committee has discussed several alternate plans in case enough volunteers can't be found.

Our congregation can participate in one or all of the following ways:

• Volunteer to can meat (chicken this year) April 5, 6, 7, 12, 13 and 14, 2021.

This is a meaningful tradition for some congregations and a time of fellowship, with each other and other volunteers.

• Donate money towards the purchase of chicken to be canned and/or to supply lunch for volunteers.

Last year both districts received 350 cases of chicken to distribute to those in need. Also, 150 cases were shipped to Liberia and 200 cases went to the Bahamas.

• Pick up and distribute canned chicken to feed the hungry – to use in your food pantry, a food pantry you work with or a need in your community, FREE.

Pick up is at the Brethren Service Center, New Windsor, MD.

Camp Mardela Announces a new Camp Administrator

The Camp Mardela board of directors is pleased to announced Jennifer Lynn Summy as the next administrator of Camp Mardela, located on 125 acres adjacent to Martinak State Park in Denton, Md. Jennifer will be moving in Dec. 30 or 31 and then starting up with training on Jan. 4, 2021.

A graduate of Lebanon Valley College (Annville, Pa.) with a B.A. in Music Business, Summy is currently working on completing a master's degree in Business Administration and Ministry from Mount Vernon

(Ohio) Nazarene University. She has previously worked as a bank teller near her home in Duncannon, Pa., and as a counselor at Camp Swatara (Bethel, Pa.).

In addition to her business and camping background, she brings to the position extensive experience in music and theater, as well as advanced Spanish-speaking abilities and a deep faith life. She recently spent a year as a worship coordinator for The World Race, with time in a variety of contexts on four continents.

"A week at camp is a powerful catalyst in the faith of children and youth, and I am passionate about making the most of that experience for all parties involved," Summy said. "Every step of my spiritual journey has come from the growth and relationships at camp, and I believe that God works in mighty ways when we meet Him in the heart of His creation."

Summy's call to the position comes after a wide-ranging, months-long search process. She succeeds Gieta Gresh, who has served the camp as administrator since spring 2005.

Affiliated with the Mid-Atlantic District of the Church of the Brethren, Camp Mardela was established in 1948 and has been serving children and youth summer campers and year-round rental groups ever since. Summy's work will include leading the camp through its strategic plan centered around its 75th anniversary: "Celebrating 75 Years, Serving the Future." Major annual events include the camp auction each spring and a camp supper in the fall.
