Pastor's I've been thinking lately of John Kline, who reportedly rode some 30,000 miles on his trusty horse, Nell, as he traveled among the Brethren and did other errands of service.

Much of that traveling occurred across the lines of North and South in the time leading up to and during the Civil War. Brethren were opposed to slavery from the beginning, but Kline's evenhanded leadership is often credited with helping to keep the church together during a time when many other denominations split into northern and southern factions.

Larry Glick, who sometimes portrays Kline in historical re-enactments, recently said in Messenger that Kline "took great personal risks during the war to maintain unity of the Brethren."

Kline's frequent travel across the boundary eventually aroused suspicion among some Southern sympathizers in his home region of Virginia that he was a spy, leading to Kline's assassination by vigilantes in June 1864. But the only thing Kline had spied was hope—the hope he constantly found in following Jesus and listening to the Spirit's "still, small voice of tender compassion and love," as he once described it.

Brethren author Dorothy Brandt Davis wrote a children's book about Kline's life titled *The Middle Man*, a testament to Kline's willingness to stand "in the middle" during those turbulent times. Others have played such a role in the church over the decades: the moderating voice of James Quinter in the late 1800s, Dan West's rallying call to service in the wake of World War II, the persistent joy and encouragement of Anna Mow later in the 20th century, and more.

Lately I've been wondering who plays that role in the church today. While the Church of the Brethren still has an important witness and much to offer, its unity has been fraying again along a different sort of battle lines. The polarized landscape and deep divisions that characterize so many aspects of life can leave the "middle" a rather lonely place to be.

While we can't let a desire to be "all things to all people" water down our faith, we do well to remember our common waters of baptism. I value the fact that this congregation seems to have a fair amount of theological and political diversity, yet still enjoys being with one another. A sense of community and a willingness to prioritize a common connection in Jesus Christ takes precedence over any differences that might exist—at least most of the time!

John Kline preached unapologetically, and sometimes called the church to accountability, but he never forgot that those he encountered—regardless of geography or other factors—were all God's children. We continue to need voices like that in the church, calling us to those middle places of common ground even when differing priorities pull us in other directions.

As we enter this Easter season, may we again find the joy of resurrection and new hope that holds us together.

We're monitoring the situation from week to week. The Christian Education team is preparing study resources each week, available in vour bulletin.



The pandemic continues to necessitate some adjustments to our usual routines. but at least this year we are able to be together to cele-

brate this special season. For Holy Week/Easter Sunday we are planning the following schedule:

- On Maundy Thursday, we will have a modified love feast service at 7 p.m. in the fellowship hall. This reflective time will include readings, music, a meditation, and communion. While we will not have a meal (please eat before coming), the deacons will distribute individual bags with symbols to help us consider the meaning of this special evening.
- Easter will begin with a sunrise service at 8 a.m., Lyons' pond (off Schwaninger Road behind Round Top), weather permitting.
- For Sunday morning Easter worship, we will offer two identical services at 9 a.m. and 11 a.m. in the church sanctuary to spread out the crowd (similar to what we did for Christmas Eve). We ask that everyone planning to attend please sign up for one of the services in advance. We'll be limiting attendance to about 50 people at each. Please sign up on the sheets in the narthex or contact the church office. We will have the Changed Cross at

both services. Please bring your fresh cut flowers to church. However, we will not be placing them individually as we did in years past. We will have one person



placing the flowers on the cross at each service.

Other worship services through the spring, will continue to be at 10 a.m. in the sanctuary. Watch your email, the website, and the weekly announcement sheets for further information. Thank you!






Please pray Christ presence and love to the Walbridge family!



### 43rd Annual Meat Canning Project CANCELED

The meat canning committee is saddened to inform the district that the 2021 meat canning event has been canceled. There were not enough volunteers signed up to cover all the needed shifts.

The committee is aware of the immense local and global need, therefore, the committee has decided to use the funds that have been donated to purchase canned meat for distribution. Your church will be notified when we have details for the distribution date and asking if your congregation would like to receive meat for distribution.

By purchasing this canned meat (which is more costly than canning it ourselves) we will be depleting the meat canning donations fund. Donations will be needed for the 2022 event as we will try once again to resume meat canning. Donations are appreciated at any time during the year and are held in a restricted funds account specifically for meat canning events.







### Talbot Interfaith Shelter
